Mayor Marvin, with Corrado Armieri, Italian consular agent in Syracuse, Mr. Pietrafesa and Mr. Baum will be in the first division of the parade. A police detail headed by Commissioner of Public Safety William E. Rapp and Chief of Police Martin L. Cadin will be ahead. Officers of the monument association, members of the auxiliary and two platoons of firemen will round out the first division.

In the division of Italian societies of Syracuse 38 groups will be represented. Like organizations from Rome, Utica and Auburn will take part in the program. It was indicated that between 2,000 and 3,000 persons will be in line.

"Giovinezza" and "La Leggenda del Piave" will be sung by 200 girls and young women in an Italian chorus. The Liederkrantz chorus will give selections.

The musical program will end with "The Stars and Stripes Forever" by the Manlius band and an Italian march by the Italian band as the assembly disperses.

The day will be rounded out with a dinner at 7:30 o'clock in the grand ballroom of Hotel Syracuse, at which Mr. Baldi and those who planned the monument from the inception of the idea to final reality will be guests of honor. Pasquale Cerio, tenor, will sing.
